



My angles measure 73° and 108°




Explain why at least one of Jack's angles must be wrong.

Challenge 2 Puzzles and problems

Ash, Si, Sami and Mani are playing a game. Each of them writes down a statement that describes a set of numbers.
 Ash writes "Multiples of five".
 Si writes "Triangular numbers".
 Sami writes "Even, but not multiples of four".
 Mani writes "Multiples of three but not multiples of nine".
 Can you find some two-digit numbers that belong in two of the sets?
 Can you find some two-digit numbers that belong in three sets?
 What is the smallest number that belongs in all four sets?

Challenge 3 – Magic V



How many different possibilities are there? What do you notice about all the solutions you find? Can you explain what you see? Can you convince someone that you have all the solutions?

What happens if we use the numbers from 2 to 6? From 12 to 16? From 37 to 41? From 103 to 107? What can you discover about a V that has arms of length 4 using the numbers 1–7?

Try to access all of the reader's senses through your writing and your challenge is to use: 3 types of subordinating clauses, short sentences for effect and a variety of linking adverbs.
